Help with holiday greetings: The handwritten holiday card was a popular tradition of the current generation of seniors. An afternoon spent helping an older relative to write and and family costs nothing more than cards and stamps but could be priceless to a senior.

Stay connected: As families grow, physical distances among relatives become greater and it becomes more and more difficult for seniors to keep in touch. Helping an older adult connect with family using devices they are usually unfamiliar with, such as Skype and smart phones, could make the holidays truly memorable.

Other simple suggestions include a family singalong, helping a senior do some online shopping if they can no longer get out to stores or a simple com.

These and other ideas often do more for seniors' spirits than any present at any price.

"The goal should always be to bring a little love and joy of the season into their lives," said Sussman.

In 2008, Scarpa graduated from the first Doctor of Nursing Practice




