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President Kagame calls on Africans to work together to address the continent's challenges



President Paul Kagame has called on leaders from across Africa to work together to address the challenges that the continent still faces. Speaking at a dinner reception dubbed 'Africa's Future' on the sidelines of the just-ended World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland; President Kagame noted that when Africans talk about their problems, they are together, but when it comes to seeking solutions and implementing them, that togetherness vanishes. Each country ends up standing individually, trying on its own.

"We have to do some alignment. Let's discuss the problems together, let's discuss the solutions together and actually let's implement them together; let's work together," President Kagame stated at the dinner which was also attended by Gabon President Ali Bongo Ondimba, Ethiopian Prime Minister Hailemariam Desalegn, Ivory Coast Prime Minister Daniel Duncan, as well as African Development Bank President Akinwumi Adesina.

President Kagame further pointed out that failure to work together leads to missing the opportunity of picking solutions from a broad range of ideas and possibilities. This explains why the continent keeps falling short and gives an impression of a 'Failing Africa'.

"We need to deal with our situation of the continent with a sense of urgency. The solutions are clear. What we need to do to deal with our problems is very clear. Let us just go ahead and do it together."

The President also reiterated the need for African countries to integrate further for shared prosperity. He emphasised that the individual approach in addressing challenges holds the continent back.

At the dinner, President Kagame spoke following a panel discussion moderated by James Irundi Mwangi, the Executive Director of Dalberg Group; Donald Kaberuka, former President of African Development Bank; Sara menker, founder and CEO of Gro Intelligence; Bono, lead singer of U2; and Jubril Adewale Tinubu, the chief executive of Dalberg Group.



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Challenges remind us there are things we should be doing - President Kagame tells WEF

On Wednesday 20 January 2016, President Paul Kagame was in Davos, Switzerland took part in this year's World Economic Forum (WEF). While speaking on a panel titled 'The Transform of Tomorrow' that discussed the implications of the digital revolution, President Kagame said that Rwanda and Africa are in transition to become part of making technology – not just consuming it.



The President further stressed that Africans and Rwandans in particular have seen multiplier effect of technology on growth, development and connecting people to solutions. Digital technologies have benefited and improved millions of lives. He pointed out that what Africa needs now is to address the policy side: "We have to address policy side and how we use technology to reduce other divide that exist. In Rwanda, making sure women are involved and using technology to serve society are policy decisions that we bring together."

President Kagame called on governments across the continent to put more efforts in facilitating the involvement of digital technologies in all sectors. On the panel, President Kagame was speaking along-side leaders in the digital technologies industry including Facebook chief operation officer Sheryl Sandberg, Microsoft Chief executive Satya Nadella, the director of Indian company Mahindra and Mahindra, Anand Mahindra, and the founder of Open Gov., Zachary Bookman.

On Thursday 21 January 2016, the President spoke on a panel about 'Africa's Next Challenge' alongside Ethiopian Premier Hailemariam Desalegn, and the President of the African Development Bank Adesina Akinwumi. Later in the evening, the President hosted 'Rwanda Night' where he welcomed participants to WEF Africa in Rwanda.

Hosted annually in Davos, Switzerland, the World Economic Forum discusses world economic issues, and is an opportunity for countries to sell their economic potentials to prospective investors. This year, the four-day summit discussed other critical challenges; including security and climate change in relation to global economic growth. The Summit was attended by over 2,500 delegates from around the world.

President Kagame hosts annual diplomats' luncheon

President Paul Kagame hosted envoys accredited to Rwanda to the annual diplomats' luncheon at Urugwiro Village. Prior to the luncheon, four new envoys from China, Denmark, Kuwait and the Czech Republic presented their credentials to the President.

Addressing the envoys, President Kagame expressed his appreciation for what the diplomats do to keep the diplomatic ties between Rwanda and their respective countries strong. He later pointed out that through combining the country resources and integration partnerships, Rwandans are determined to prosper. The President listed some projects like the Northern Corridor Integration Projects and the recently globally endorsed Sustainable Development Goals whose implementation require firm partnerships.

"Rwandans are working to be our best selves, fully responsible for our future, a burden to no one. You are in position to see this first-hand and provide useful context, back to headquarters, when called upon," President Kagame told the envoys. President Kagame further reiterated that Rwanda values the free open dialogue with friends and partners by listening carefully and participating whenever necessary. He stressed that Rwanda contributes significantly to global cooperation because, "it reflects who we are as a people." President Kagame assured the diplomats that Rwanda's diplomacy and international engagement will continue to be resolutely multilateral, collaborative and judicious.

Speaking on behalf of the envoys, the Dean of the Diplomatic Corps and Uganda's Ambassador to Rwanda, Richard Kabonero, said that it is clear to everyone that Rwanda registers remarkable progress every year: "A few of us who have been here longer, have witnessed a lot of development in ICT, peacekeeping, education, peace and stability. We congratulate the people of Rwanda for a well organised referendum (...) Rwanda will be a prosperous country in the not so distant future."

The Minister of Foreign Affairs and Cooperation, Louise Mushikiwabo said that Rwanda's diplomacy has enlarged, and Rwandans hope the New Year would come with better tidings.



President Kagame holds talks with US Secretary of Commerce

On 28 January President Paul Kagame received in his office a delegation led by the United States Secretary of Commerce, Penny Pritzker, for a business roundtable themed "The economic benefits of integration". The delegation included 13 members of the US President's Advisory Council on Doing Business in Africa (PAC-DBIA) and African CEOs.



The meeting is a follow up to the US-Africa Summit that took place in the US in August, 2014. Speaking at the meeting, President Kagame said that it is encouraging to have business leaders in the region and national leaders coming together to discuss investment opportunities in the region and in Rwanda in particular. "I welcome you on the backdrop of the relationship we have had for a long time and want to strengthen the relations between the United States and the East African Community and the wide Sub-Saharan Africa," President Kagame said.

The President expressed his gratitude for the follow up on commitments made between countries during the US-Africa Summit.

In her remarks, the US Secretary of Commerce, Penny Pritzker pointed out that the US President's Advisory Council on Doing Business in Africa has chosen Rwanda as their second destination during their visit to the continent because the country is one of Africa's remarkable economic success stories.

"I visited Rwanda five years ago and found the people of Rwanda quite remarkable. We are focused on steps the US Government can take to support the establishment of stronger and lasting commercial partnerships between the US and the Africa private sectors — especially regions and countries where there have been considerable economic success. Rwanda is a prime example of this."

She further added that from a commercial perspective, Rwanda's climb to the World Bank ease of doing business is notable. She recalled how during her last visit to Rwanda, she was impressed with the one-stop-shop for investors, both local and foreign that she went back to her hometown Chicago and proposed that they need to do the same thing.

The Business Roundtable focused on enhancing regional integration in Africa. Participants included business leaders and executives from the United States, CEOs doing business on the continent as well as in Rwanda.

The US Secretary of Commerce and President Obama's Advisory Council met RDB Officials on Doing Business in Rwanda

On 28th January 2016, Rwanda Development Board CEO Honorable Francis Gatare hosted the US Secretary of commerce, Penny Pritzker, and delegation comprised of senior executives of leading American companies including GE, McKinsey and the renowned Carlyle Group. The main intention of the visit was to experience key aspects in the development of Rwanda including trade, business and tax collection.

During the meeting, CEO Gatare highlighted investment opportunities in Rwanda and the incentives offered to investors. He also pointed at Rwanda's recently updated investment code and the simplified tax regime. "We have made great progress in building Rwanda as a preferred investment destination and instituted several initiatives to reform the doing business environment," he said

The head of the delegation of American investors, Secretary Penny Pritzker, who had previously visited Rwanda as a member of the private sector, said that it was terrific to watch the evolution of Rwanda. "We are very impressed by the remarkable progress made in the economic and social sectors," said Ms Pritzker.



Rwanda Revenue Authority Deputy Commissioner General Bizimana Pascal added that the institution's growth and the increasing role of tax revenues in national development was very clear. "We will soon establish a special desk for VAT refund to investors to addressing tax-related concerns of foreign investors," he noted, pointing out that investors will be taken through the new investment code to achieve clarity.

The delegation was briefed on the ongoing regional integration efforts in East African Community, and particularly within the Northern Corridor framework. "They were impressed with the various common projects and initiatives already implemented, including the Single Area Network, the Common Tourist Visa, as well as various infrastructure projects in transport, energy, and ICT", said CEO Gatare

The American business leaders expressed strong commitment to explore partnership in many of these projects. Progress will be assessed during a planned US-Africa Business summit later this year. This is the Council's first trip to the African continent, they chose Rwanda and Nigeria as two destinations because over the past 20 years, the countries have been a remarkable success story. Much of this positive progress is the result of a concerted and focused approach to economic and commercial policymaking.

First Lady calls on young leaders to learn from their elders

First Lady Jeannette Kagame has called on young leaders to learn from their elders who fought to stop the 1994 Genocide against the Tutsi, liberate the country from a bad leadership and pave the way for sustainable development. The First Lady spoke on Saturday 09 January 2015 in Bugesera, Eastern Province where more than 300 young leaders were gathered to reflect on the different aspects of good leadership.

First Lady Jeannette Kagame also advised the youth to maximize the opportunities availed to them by the country's leadership: "I encourage you to learn from those who have paved the way for you and maximize from the many opportunities availed to you, the precious sons of daughters of this land."

She further added that young leaders should always bear in mind that they don't have to be hostages of theories proclaiming that progress/prosperity are reserved for a select number of civilizations.

The First Lady reminded the youth that leaders are defined by tough choices in the face of great adversity and encouraged them to pursue their dreams no matter what happens on the way.

"You should not shy away from taking a tougher stand and hold your ground, for fear of unknown consequences. Aspire to great things, nurture this fighting spirit in you, and its flame will guide you to even greater heights."

Young leaders at the conference shared their testimonies on how, a few years ago, they dared to start their own businesses, and today, they are enjoying the fruits of their efforts. One of them, Clarisse Iribagiza, the CEO and Founder of Hehe Lab, a technology innovation hub, said that among the things that helped her business prosper are the various platforms that she was given – as one of the rare women entrepreneurs, to explain her project.

Themed 'Sowing seeds of excellence in young leaders generation'; the gathering was the first of its kind, a prelude to the National Prayer Breakfast.

Rwandan leaders vow to always strive to fulfill people's needs

Rwandan leaders from central and local government, civil society organisations and private sectors have vowed to always strive to fulfill Rwandans' needs as the country moves forward towards a more sustainable future.

The leaders who were gathered at this year's National Leaders Fellowship Prayer Breakfast held yesterday expressed their gratitude to God for the country's visionary leadership which has been at the forefront of the tremendous achievements registered in the past two decades.



Speaking at the gathering, Prime Minister Anastase Murekezi listed a number of milestones reached last year, most of which recognised globally. These include the recent World Bank report that ranked Kigali among globally competitive cities; the 2015 Global Competitiveness Report where Rwanda stands out among the most efficient governments; and last year's World Bank Doing Business that ranked Rwanda second-best on the African continent.

The Premier attributed all the numerous strides made in 2015 to God, who, he said, has always been close to the country and its leadership. "God has availed us with a visionary leadership and helped Rwandans to work together with unity and passion aimed to bring the best out of everyone of us towards national dignity."

Organised by Rwanda Leaders' Fellowship (RLF), the National Leaders Fellowship Prayer Breakfast was initiated in 1995 as gathering for leaders in high-ranking positions across the government and the private sector for fellowship to pray for the country's leadership and the whole nation.

Themed "Instilling Godly Values in Leadership", this year's gathering brought together cabinet members, parliamentarians, members of the judiciary, military and national police representatives, as well as members of the civil society and private sector organisations.

Budget revised upward as social protection, education and health get more funding

On 29 January the Minister of Finance and Economic Planning, Claver Gatete, tabled before Parliament the proposed 2015/16 revised Budget. The latter has been revised upward by Frw 40.6 billion meaning that the budget estimates for the fiscal year now stand at Frw 1,808.8 billion, up from Frw 1.76 which was initially approved by Parliament in June 2015.

Presenting the revised Budget before Parliament, Minister Claver Gatete pointed out that the upward revision is a result of a budgetary loan from the World Bank worth Frw 18.4 billion for social protection, Frw 15.9 billion support from the United Kingdom's Department for International Development (DFID) for education programmes and Frw 15.6 billion from Global Fund HIV budget.

Domestic resources are increase to Frw 1,048.6 billion from Frw 1,046.2 billion that was initially approved by Parliament. This has an overall slight increase of Frw 2.5 billion.

The Minister stressed that the revision will help in the speeding up and completion of ongoing development, play a role in reducing fiscal deficit as the country aims to cut down reliance on external financing.

On the expenditure side, the recurrent budget has been revised upward to Frw 891.6 billion from Frw 877.2 Billion in original budget indicating a net increase of Frw 14.4 billion.

The rise in expenditure

e will cover major spending shortfalls as follows: Addition of Frw 3.0 billion to National Electoral Commission to cater for referendum and local government elections, Frw 2 billion to cater for African Nations Championship (CHAN) organization, Frw 3.7 billion to cater for operations in Rwandan Diplomatic Missions abroad and Frw 4.3 billion for the salaries of new teachers to be recruited and shortfall in salaries of police officers, the army, Workforce Development Agency and National Agriculture Export Development Board.



Rwanda welcomed Chan 2016 participants

National teams from across Africa arrived in Kigali as the country geared up to host the fourth edition of the African Nationals Championship known as 'Chan 2016'. Organized by the African Football Confederation (CAF), the biennial tournament was reserved for African football players who played in their national leagues contrary to the higher profile Africa Cup of Nations championship in which African players based overseas can also participate. Previous editions were hosted by Ivory Coast, Sudan and South Africa respectively.

In an interview, the Minister of Sports and Culture, Julienne Uwacu pointed out the fact that, in order to welcome Chan 2016 participants, Rwanda has waived visa fees for all nationals from countries that will compete at the tournament. For African passport holders, visas are being issued on arrival.\

"We did this to open Rwanda to the world. As we are expecting a big number of fans who will be coming to support their teams; we are trying to remove all the barriers that could hinder their being part of this. Rwanda and Rwandans are ready for the African Nations Championships," Minister Uwacu said.

The Minister further stressed that Chan 2016 presents an ideal opportunity not only for Rwandan players but for all participating African players to show their abilities. Agents for big teams will be scouting for players throughout the tournament. To the Rwandan National team, Minister Uwacu said, Chan 2016 is an occasion for them to gauge themselves against bigger teams which leads to improvement.

In the build up to the championship, major renovations were carried out in Kigali City at both Amahoro and Nyamirambo stadiums; in Huye District at Huye Stadium and in Rubavu District at Umuganda Stadium. The four stadiums are ready and the service provides from accommodation, to logistics, to health care.

The Government invested an estimated 16 billion Rwandan Francs on infrastructure and general organisation.

The 16 competing nations were divided into four groups: Group A is composed of Gabon, Ivory Coast, Morocco and Rwanda; Angola, Cameroon, the Democratic Republic of Congo and Ethiopia make up Group B; Group C contains Guinea, Niger, Nigeria and Tunisia and Group D is made up of Mali, Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe. DR Congo won the title.



Chan 2016 Opening Ceremony and Opening Match

A cocktail of events, including traditional dance, acrobatics, skating, drumming and mixed views on which team would win the tournament coloured with public excitement underpinned the opening of the 2016 CAF African Nations Championship, with President Kagame gracing the opening ceremony in Kigali.

The president, who was accompanied by First Lady Jeannette Kagame, was flanked by CAF president Issa Hayatou, who is also the acting head of FIFA.

He condensed Rwanda's pride in hosting the tournament in a few words. "I declare the fourth edition of the African Nations Championship 2016, Rwanda, open," Kagame said to deafening applause.

Earlier, each country bedecked in their respective national colours showcased traditional performance, marching around the pitch to thunderous applause.

The opening match between Rwanda's Amavubi (Wasps) against Ivory Coast's Elephants kicked off at 3pm local time, with the stadium filled to capacity with largely local fans drawn from across the country at the tournament at Amahoro National Stadium.

It was a bright start for hosts Rwanda with a 1-0 victory over Ivory Coast in the opening game of the 2016 African Nations Championship (CHAN).





Minister Mushikiwabo attended the World Economic Forum

Rwanda's Minister of Foreign Affairs and Cooperation, Louise Mushikiwabo, took part in the 46th World Economic Forum (WEF) Annual Meeting where she addressed two panels . The 46th WEF took place in Davos-Klosters, Switzerland from 20-23 January 2016.



Minister Mushikiwabo addressed a panel on the "New Security Context" where panelists discussed how the international security landscape is transforming in the wake of violent extremism, regional rivalries and proxy wars. Minister Mushikiwabo said that leaders need to think first about their people and improve inclusiveness and management of diversity. She said:" For Africa, insecurity mostly stems from a sense of exclusion within certain parts of our nations' populations. As leaders, we will need to improve inclusiveness and management of diversity."

On Thursday 21 January 2016, Minister Mushikiwabo was part of a session entitled "Responding to Fragility" where she featured as panelist. In Africa, she asserts that fragility is not a fatality. Minister Mushikiwabo said: "As leaders, we should work harder and give a sense of belonging to our people; avoid neglect in our societies. As leaders, we will have to work harder and diligently to deliver on hopes and expectations vested in us. Finally, we must provide employment to African youth if we are to address volatility and fragility of our societies."

The theme of the Meeting was "Mastering the Fourth Industrial Revolution". Every year, world leaders and senior government officials congregate in Davos, Switzerland to discuss the most pressing global issues at the World Economic Forum. This year's 46th edition ran from January 20-23, 2016 and Rwanda was well represented. Without a doubt, technology has had a big role in mapping the economic transformation witnessed in Rwanda and other developing nations around the

world. Investment in technology through the Smart Rwanda plan has focused on creating technology solutions to some of the country's biggest problems like banking, education and health services. The use of technology has helped create connections and access to information for a country where the majority of the population lives away from urban centers.

The general assembly's theme "Mastering the Fourth Industrial Revolution" was unpacked in several panel sessions, while trying to address the impact of the digital revolution in the various sectors of the economy.

Dutch firms explore investment opportunities in tourism sector

Representatives of several Dutch companies interested in the tourism sector were in Rwanda to identify viable investment opportunities. The companies, led by GreenDreamCompany, a Dutch group that specializes in sustainable area development of natural and cultural heritage sites with the use of tourism stayed for a week.

The trade mission came a week after local industry operators again showcased Rwanda's vast tourism potential during a week-long tourism fair Vakantiebeurs 2016 in Utrecht, the Netherlands.

The GreenDreamCompany owners, Léon van Rijckevorsel and Leontine van Hooft, led the delegation. "The GreenDreamCompany is specializing in leisure and tourism sector development. All parties who joined the mission are companies who are involved in our planned developments in Rwanda. This is a fieldtrip to visit all locations and to meet local stakeholders," van Hooft, told Sunday Times in an e-mail. "We ourselves have been coming here for the past three years. This is the first time our design and development team comes to see the locations and to start up the creative process."

Their website indicates that GreenDreamCompany has a vision to create a 'chain' of beautiful tourism resorts and destinations in Africa, all inspired by the travels of the ancient King Solomon. They are working to connect beautiful locations in 15 countries under their brand name: "Solomon's Hidden Treasures." Their first projects will be located in Rwanda and Ethiopia, two countries rich in cultural and natural heritage. The couple and a group of partners developed 'Solomon's Hidden Treasures Rwanda' which aims to develop sustainable projects serving tourists.

Robert Kayinamura, First Counselor at the Rwandan embassy in The Hague, said that for the past three years, they had been meeting GreenDreamCompany owners and provided assistance. Kayinamura said: "Now they are coming with partners and financiers to meet all stakeholders and then finalize plans. The embassy has met them several times in line with the country's economic policy of tourism development which will play an important role in economic development. They are going to add to our infrastructure. Then they will be part of the marketing of Rwanda as a tourist destination."

The countries that GreenDreamCompany wants to connect through the Solomon's Hidden Treasure chain of resorts are: Israel–Egypt–North and South Sudan–Ethiopia–Uganda–Burundi-Rwanda–Tanzania–Zambia–Malawi–Zimbabwe–Mozambique–South Africa and Lesotho. Meanwhile, the recently published 2015 edition of the Africa Tourism Monitor, an annual report of the AfDB, New York University's Africa House and the Africa Travel Association, says tourism is on the rise on the African continent but is yet to reach its full potential. The report said Africa international tourism arrivals increased to 65.3 million in 2014 while international tourism receipts total \$43.6 billion in the same year.

Rwanda maintains fair ranking in corruption report

Rwanda has maintained good ranking in its stance against corruption among the East African Community peers, according to a new report. The Corruption Perception Index (CPI) 2015 by Transparency International shows that Rwanda is the fourth least corrupt country in Africa and 44th globally.

In the East African Community, Rwanda comes on top followed by Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda and Burundi. In sub-Saharan Africa, Botswana claimed the top position followed by Cape Verde, Seychelles, Rwanda, then Mauritius and Namibia. Rwanda's percentage score improved from 49 to 54 percent, it says.

In 2014 Rwanda was ranked among the five least corrupt countries in Africa and 55th out of 175 countries surveyed globally with 49 per cent.

The CPI covers 168 countries around the world, tackling public perceptions for corruption in the public sector. At a global level, Denmark emerged as the least corrupt nation for the second year running, followed by Finland, Sweden, New Zealand, Netherlands and Norway.

Speaking at the report launch, Marie-Immaculée Ingabire, chairperson of Transparency International Rwanda, implored Rwandan government to fight perceived corruption in public sector, especially during contract negotiation for public investments and procurement in order to improve its ranking further.

Clément Musangabatware, Rwanda's deputy Ombudsman in charge of preventing and fighting corruption cautioned there is still a long way to have a free corruption society despite the fair ranking.

Corruption, he said, remains the most daunting challenge to good governance, sustainable economic growth, peace, stability and development in Africa. "Corruption stops economic growth by discouraging foreign investments, creates distortion in resource allocation and competitive markets, increases the cost of doing business, and reduces the net-value of public spending," said Musangabatware.
